This term we have also enjoyed Book Week and World Book Day, with a fun packed week organised by our reading lead, Lauren Fabian Miller. Where the children were once again inspired by our visiting authors. It was a really lovely week. Big thanks to the PTA for funding the Author visits.

It has been lovely to see parents at school for parents' evening this term. We look forward to next term when there will be celebration class assemblies. Parental engagement is really important to us and we continue to aim to develop effective partnerships with parents in order to enhance the learning and development of the children.

To finish the term off the children have enjoyed the annual Easter activities. We were very impressed with the creativity the children showed with their Easter Bonnets! All children will have received a chocolate egg. Thank you to the PTA for providing these.

Once again there have been so many curriculum highlights for this term. Please make sure you follow us on \underline{X} (<u>Twitter</u>) and <u>Instagram</u>. These are just a snapshot of some that the teachers would like to share:

★ Reception - In Term 4, the Reception children have been honing their storytelling skills! We have learnt the story of the Gingerbread Man in depth which has been a catalyst for using lots of story language and new vocabulary during role play. We also looked and talked about changing states of matter when we baked and decorated our own Gingerbread biscuits. We have also been learning about the Easter story, helped along by an insightful visit to the Cathedral at the end of this term

★ Year 1 - This term Year 1 have really enjoyed learning all about David Attenborough and Mary Anning. We discussed the similarities between these two significant individuals but how very different their lives are! The children have enjoyed thinking like scientists through the creation of their own animals at the end of the unit - it was great to see such a variety of crazy and creative animals!



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★ Year 2 - This term we have done a lot of work on multiplication and division - two very big topics in maths. Year 2 have shown great perseverance and understanding, bringing their 'maths toolkits' to every lesson! Through drawing diagrams and skip-counting, we are now able to use the multiplication and division symbols with some pretty big numbers! Well done Year 2 and keep practising!

★ Year 3 - In term 4, Year 3 have been doing some brilliant learning. We have written up some incredible instructions about how to use spy kits, an idea we got from our book this term, Operation Gadgetman. In maths we have been using column method for addition and subtraction and in science we have been biologists, looking at the characteristics of living things and delving into exactly what plants need to thrive.

★ Year 4 - This term Year 4 have been writing explanatory texts using our knowledge of digestion from last term. We thought about how to present all our information in a clear and entertaining way. In maths, we have been thinking about fractions and mixed numbers and have started to add fractions. We also had a fantastic Viking day which really brought our history learning to life.

★ Year 5 - This term, Year 5 have been reading 'The Boy in the Tower' and have brilliantly shown their summarising and prediction reading skills to help understand why all of the buildings in London have fallen down. As scientists, we have been learning about Earth and Space and have been able to link our knowledge of how night and day occurs with our geography knowledge about the Prime Meridian and time zones. Finally in computing, we have loved doing stop-motion animation and using 'onion skinning' to create some masterpieces!

 $rac{1}{2}$ Year 6 - This term, Year 6 has been learning how to write a newspaper article. To support their learning they did independent research about the arrival of the Empire Windrush and stepped into the shoes of a news reporter. They then used their historical knowledge and skills to imagine how the passengers and onlookers would have felt, translating their thoughts into direct quotes and reported speech. Their final articles were amazing and we were thrilled to be able to type them up and make them look as realistic as possible!

★ PE - Year 3 have had a fantastic term of learning in their PE lessons at Failand. We have focused on the 'creative' aspect of our curriculum, with the children exploring how they can 'respond differently' to changing tasks and situations in the games they play. They have worked hard on developing their passing and receiving skills in both football and netball so that they can make decisions about how to attack their opponents. We've seen lots of enthusiasm and have been impressed with the creative ideas the children have shared in our discussions. Well done Year 3, keep practising during the holidays!

★ Forest School - Year 4 have been exploring the curriculum at Forest School, looking at navigation through orienteering and map reading moving around using these skills. We have also been using maths skills to approximately age a tree measuring and using formulas to find the age range in the woods. We have also been helping our woodland space by building dead wood hedges creating habitats for invertebrates, fungi and small mammals. Reggae and Country classes enjoyed cooking their homemade bread over the fire with lashings of butter, it tasted so good. Well done Year 4 you have been amazing, your enthusiasm and energy this term is inspirational.

Samba and Swing classes have been so resilient at Forest School, they have not let the wet weather dampen their spirits. We have been exploring our natural world looking at colours, textures helping one another when we are unsure. We have had lots of fun playing in the mud kitchen, on the swings and building dens. Massive thank you to all the Parents/Carers who have volunteered for the Reception sessions. Reception parents If you wish to volunteer for a session please let the office know, they will fill you in on the procedure.

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Values

This term throughout collective worship we have focused on the value of **Justice** The children have thought about what **Justice** means to us. Our poem this term helps us to think about what **Justice** is:

Justice is....

Judging what is right Understanding what is fair Standing up for those who need help Trying to listen to both sides Informed and wise decisions Caring enough to take action Equal opportunities for all

Throughout this term the children have been learning about **Justice** in lots of different ways. These are some of the ways that the different classes have been learning about **Justice** this term:

Reception - The Reception children have been talking a lot about fairness and justice this term. We have been learning about the story of the Gingerbread Man and thinking hard about whether justice was served to the Gingerbread Man in his sticky ending with the cunning fox. They have also been demonstrating justice by showing that everyone joins in with tidy up time each day.

★ Year 1 - This term Year 1 have had a lot of discussions around things being fair. Firstly, we looked at the Easter story and how important it is to Christians. They have talked in depth about the decisions Jesus made to tell his disciples to leave and pretend they did not know him. We thought about whether they would make the same choices! We've also been thinking about what is fair in some of our reading extracts. Through role play the children thought about what they would do if they were in the story!

★ Year 2 - Year 2 have been looking at the Easter story in RE and World Values. We have been discussing 'Salvation' and 'sins', linking to our value of Justice through the idea that Christians believe God will forgive and Jesus died to pay for our sins. We discussed whether this was Justice or not and had some great ideas!

★ Year 3 - In our reading lessons, Year 3 have been keeping up with Beans's search for justice in Operation Gadgetman. It's a page turner and we can't wait to get to the exciting conclusion. During world book week, the amazing author Jen Reid spoke to us about justice in all communities. We learnt that, through her brave acts, a statue that many felt was unjust, was permanently taken down.

Year 4 - Year 4 are loving their class book 'The Boy at the Back of the Class'. It has provoked really interesting discussions around justice for refugees and we have felt moved by the story.

★ Year 5 - In RE and World Values, Year 5 have been looking at Jesus' sacrifices in the Christian Easter story and how this brought about justice. We have also been reading 'The Boy in the Tower' in reading lessons and have observed the hardships that a community and individuals can go through, which highlighted the importance of justice for people and communities in order to thrive

★ Year 6 - Year 6 have been learning all about the Windrush Generation as part of History, Geography and English. They have produced lots of wonderful work and participated in brilliant discussions about how migrants from the West Indies were unjustly treated after migrating to Britain. To end the unit of work, we talked all about the injustice of the Windrush Scandal and how we can work as a community to start to bring justice to the Windrush Generation.



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Collective Voices have continued to inspire the children with their support in Collective Worship. This term they have supported Mrs Yarnold to deliver Collective Worship at the Brandon hill site.

Next term our collective worship will be focused on Service.
