
We ended the term finishing our very own versions of the book 'The Promise' and the writing was incredible! We'll have to share some of these with everyone when we get back to school!

Using Framed Choices to reduce conflict

We are continuing to see lots of lovely work from the children returned through Seesaw. However as a parent, I know it is not always as easy to get your own child to carry out learning tasks at home, as it is for the teachers to do this in school! I thought it might be helpful to share another technique we use in school to support children who are finding it difficult to engage in a task or follow an instruction.

Framed choices are about giving children a sense of control over a situation, which in turn reduces anxiety and can hopefully avert a conflict. Rather than asking a child to carry out a particular task, they are given two choices, both of which the adult would be happy for them to take.

For example, if a child had been asked to complete 5 maths questions and we knew they were able to do this, understood the task, but had refused to engage, we might say, "Ok, you have a choice, you can either do 3 questions or 4 questions. What would you like to do?"

Hopefully they will say "3 questions." have a go at the questions and we can praise them for completing the task.

It is important to remember that the choices must work for both people. The choice of, "You can either do 4 questions or have no playtime!" is not really giving the child 2 choices.

Another thing to bear in mind is that once a child has completed the agreed task, we should accept that and praise, rather than trying to get them to do just one more, which can be very tempting. This way, if we want to use the strategy again they will know we will stick to our agreement.

I find this can also be a good strategy to use when agreeing how much more time a child can have on an ipad game, or what time they will go up to bed.

Having a positive and honest conversation with your child will give them the best opportunity to stay safe on the internet. Agree on what should happen if they are expected to use the internet outside of Seesaw. Do they know how to safely navigate around the websites suggested? If not, perhaps you could ask that they come to you for guidance or to oversee this transition.

You could use pens, pencils or paint to fill in your background. Will you use stripes, waves or even zigzags to fill your paper?




Cut your bunny out of white paper, add a cute face and stick it onto the background.

Easter Activity Ideas

- 1. Organise your Lego and then have a building challenge. Who can build the best house, hotel or shop?
- 2. Have a Living Room disco play freeze, musical chairs, have a dance off!
- 3. Build a house with a deck of cards
- 4. Make a time capsule of this time to be opened in 10 years
- 5. Learn how to bake bread
- 6. Organise the books on your shelf into a rainbow of colours
- 7. Make up a workout and do it together (eg: 25 star jumps, 20 squats, 15 crunches, hop like a bunny around the lounge room, frog leap your partner)
- 8. Easy homemade slime, just add equal amounts shampoo and corn flour and put in the fridge for 15 minutes!
- 9. Second slime idea, just add 5tbs salt to a medium squirt of shampoo and freeze for 35 minutes!
- 10. Shaving foam painting, mix some shaving foam with some paint to create ultra fluffy paint!
- 11. Make a scene in a shoebox; have the box on it's side so you are looking into it like it is a stage. Now use paper, card, junk, lego etc to create a scene. You could make a scene from your favourite film or story, a particular place or room, or even outer space! You might add characters stuck onto straws and use it to put on puppet shows.
- 12. Host a party for your toys or family members. Write your guestlist, design and write invitations and name cards, decide which games to play, create a music playlist, have a brilliant time.
- 13. Create an A-Z of items in your house. Write the alphabet down the side of a piece of paper and see if you can find and write an object for each letter.
- 14. KS2 appropriate-Learn to play Canasta <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Canasta</u> (quite complicated initially but once you get the hang of it you can play who gets to 5000 points first and have a leaderboard with family) Brilliant if you like a bit of competition! (you will need 2 packs of cards with jokers)
- 15. As a family, sign up for Gareth Malone's 'Great British Home Chorus' and start learning his songs!

 - 2. It is attached to a building, built in 1906, which can help people to read.
 - 3. The rooms in this building are all names after types of music.
 - Of course it is Cathedral Primary School.
- 18. Origami Some great simple ideas on Origami Resource Center.
- 19. Go on a virtual 'holiday' ; pick a country and make it in to a project: find it on the map, explore what it looks like, people, music, history, politics, art, religion, sport, customs, beautiful places, celebrated people; watch films, eat food, read stories, listen to music from that country. Make and do related stuff: food, art, games, music, etc. I'm 'going' to France next week!...
