## A message from Mrs Yarnold

Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope you have all been enjoying the wonderful warm weather this week. I have seen some lovely outdoor learning taking place through Seesaw. Please make sure if your child is coming into school that they have sunscreen on and a hat.

We are now coming towards the end of the school year. The last day of the summer term is Tuesday 7th July. Seesaw learning will continue until this date. Once school is closed there will be some significant build projects taking place. The development of the playground has already started with some of the play items being made and Touchwood will be starting the site work on the first day of the summer holidays. Within the school building we will be developing a new classroom space on the Key Stage 2 floor. This space is being created through some additional library space which will be developed into a classroom next to current Soul class. Finally, many of you will have noticed that the paid parking has been removed on College Square. This area is now going to be further developed and the pavement area extended. It will be exciting when children return to school to see all of these developments.

You may have heard last Friday's announcement that the government expects all pupils to return to school in September, and the suggestion that they would operate in "bubbles" containing 30 pupils. At the moment, this is all the information we have; we are still awaiting a new set of guidelines from the Department for Education about how this might be realised, and what additional control measures may need to be in place. As always, we will let you know as soon as we have more information – and we will always put the health and safety of children, staff and the wider community first.

As many of you will know Miss Tennant has been at Cathedral Primary school for three years as a Year 1 teacher. Miss Tennant has been instrumental in the development of Forest School and the Green Team. Her passion for the environment and outdoor learning has led to some significant changes to our curriculum and understanding of the environment. She has led the Green Team and encouraged our children to be vocal and proactive in the small and big changes we can make. Miss Tennant is now planning to move to Copenhagen in the next few months and for this reason has decided to resign from her teaching post. Miss Tennant will still be supporting the school in September on a supply basis until she has confirmation of her travel plans. We will of course let you all know when Miss Tennant leaves to go to Copenhagen but look forward to still seeing her at school in September.

Some of 'Hip-Hop class' have been finding creative ways to read during the heatwave!








# Year 3

**DHK School Dogs**. During February half term, I was lucky enough to attend a two day course at the headquarters of the charity 'Dogs Helping Kids', to find out more about how their highly trained school dogs work in schools and to see if this was something that Cathedral Primary School might become a part of. I met some fantastic dogs, one of whom is called Fearny and is based at Winford Primary School just outside of Bristol.

The charity aims to help teach children non violence, empathy, respect, kindness, love, responsibility, friendship and trust through their School Dog programme. Children are taught about the right way to safely interact with dogs they may encounter when they are out and about and older children can take part in a programme to learn more about responsible dog ownership.





DHK dogs are specifically trained to work in an individual school and belong to a member of staff. They have a whole year of puppy training, coming into school part time, before they are able to start working with children. The dogs continue with training and assessments under the direction of DHK for the next two years, which is a similar level of training to that received by guide dogs, before becoming fully fledged school dogs.





Within school, the dogs take on a variety of roles; they build confidence in struggling readers, listening intently whilst a child reads to them; they offer morning check ins for children who are reluctant about coming into school; help build confidence and self esteem through children engaging in training activities; and reward and motivate learners with classroom visits or lunch time dog walks. Permission is always obtained from parents/carers before a child is able to work with a school dog.

We are hoping that in the future we can become a DHK school and have our own school dog. If you would like to find out more about the charity and their work, you can visit their website:
